### INTRODUCTION.

In issuing this book to the Public, the publisher wishes to return thanks to the many who have helped the enterprise, and especially the generous support of most of our business men.

Instead of inserting a long history of the village and surrounding country, as is sometimes done, the publisher choose rather to insert short historical sketches of most of the public organizations. These sketches were generally prepared by some officer of each organization, and thus may be considered reliable. And here, again, our thanks must be returned to these persons for their assistance, and especially to the pastors of the various churches, who, without exception, either wrote the required statement or furnished all the necessary information. We trust these historical sketches will prove of interest to our readers. One of the most useful and attractive features of the book is a lithographic map, made with great care, and engraved expressly for this work, at considerable expense.

The canvass for names was taken with considerable care, from all the houses as well as the places of business, yet of the fact that there are some errors there is no doubt. It is only hoped they are few and unimportant. Thus we present this Directory, hoping that the public will in some measure appreciate the effort to publish an accurate as well as a cheap book of reference.

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### Churches.

#### FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

This church is indeed the pioneer church of this vicinity. It was organized by two missionaries, Rev. Messrs. Chapman and Williston, in January, 1804, a time when, as Dr. Wisner says in his semi-centennial sermon, "intemperance, licentiousness and their concomitant vices marched in the track of Sabbath desecration!" Thirteen members made up the little church. The first pastor was Rev. G. Mandeville, who preached at this church and at one formerly organized at Trumansburg on alternate Sundays. The church continued for twelve years under his ministry. At this time he became so discouraged that he left without being dismissed. The first deacon was Jacob Yaple, one of the three original settlers of this valley.

On the 3d of February, 1816, more than fifty years ago, Rev. Dr. Wisner, now just past his eighty-seventh birthday, commenced his labors. Of the twenty members, he was obliged to excommunicate six, and his earnest, zealous labors soon brought their fruit in greatly increased numbers and interest, so that in 1820 the number of members was 113. During the remaining eleven years of his first term of ministry, the church was blessed with several revivals, and in 1832 there were 761 members. The difficulties which Dr. Wisner met and surmounted were very great. Soon after he came to this church, several of the congregation were engaged in a horse race one Sabbath, within sight and at the time of divine service. But he was fearless and

conscientious in the discharge of his duty. Seeing the suffering caused by intemperance, he preached a temperance sermon from the text, "Woe unto him who giveth his neighbor drink, who putteth his bottle to him, to make him drunk." The next morning a tavern sign was found nailed up at his door. The enraged liquor dealers could not endure the truth.

Many other annoyances and trials were endured, such as the burning by a mob of the school house where they worshiped, shearing the pastor's horse, hiding his carriage wheels in the woods, &c.

Dr. Wisner was succeeded in 1831, by Rev. William Page, who remained one year.

Rev. Alfred E. Campbell was installed August 1832, and remained two years.

Rev. J. W. McCulloch was pastor from January, 1835, to April, 1838.

About this time Dr. Wisner returned to Ithaca, and found his old pulpit again vacant. He was soon reinstalled, and kept the charge until 1848—as long as his health would permit.

The succeeding pastors have been:

Rev. Selden Haynes, November, 1849, to May, 1850.

- " William M. McHarg, December, 1850, to April, 1857.
- " T. Dwight Hunt, January 13th, 1858.
- " David Torrey, D. D., March, 1860.
- " Theodore F. White was installed November 1st, 1865, and is the present pastor.

The first church building was erected in 1818, and was altered and enlarged in 1825. It thus stood for nearly thirty years, when it was torn down (1853), and the present commodious church erected. It stands on the north side of the Central Park, corner of Cayuga and E. Mill streets.

The Sabbath School was organized in April, 1826, holding its meetings in the Academy building. The number soon increased from the original fifty, and is now about 250.

Mr. George McChain has been the able superintendent for 14 years.

#### AURORA STREET M. E. CHURCH.

The Methodist Society in Ithaca, was first organized by the Rev. John Broadhead, in 1794, and consisted of 18 members.

The preaching and social meetings were held in the house of Mr. McDowall. The members mostly living some distance in the country, the society, as a distinct villege society, was after a few years disbanded; and with the exception of occasional or very irregular preaching, little was done for the revival of the extinct society, till about the year 1817, when Mr. David Ayres, a merchant from New York, established himself in business in this village. He was a man of singular energy and zeal, and very soon secured the regular services of a minister. In the month of August or September, the upper room of a warchouse owned by Mr. Levi Leonard, where the Presbyterians had formerly worshiped, was secured for the use of the Methodist Church. A regular society, or church, was organized by Rev. James Kelsey, consisting of the following named persons: David Ayres, Mrs. David Ayres, William DUMMER, ANSON TITUS, Mrs. Anson Titus, Elizabeth Sidney, afterwards Mrs. Bloom, Maria Wright and Mary Barber.

At the session of Conference, in the summer of 1818, Rev. George Harmon was appointed as their minister, and labored with great success. In 1819, Rev. George Densmore was sent to take charge of the little society. Under his supervision, and by the unparalleled and persistent energy of Mr. Ayres, a neat and commodious church edifice, forty-four by fifty-eight feet, was completed, on a spacious lot donated for the purpose by Hon. Simeon DeWitt, on the corner of Aurora and Mill streets, the site of the present Aurora Street M. E. Church. It cost about \$5,000. The first church bell in Ithaca, sounded its pleasant tones from the tower of this church. The church was duly dedicated by Rev. G. W. Densmore, the pastor.

The present beautiful church edifice was erected in 1866. It is built of brick, is 58 by 80 feet in size, has a fine ornamented front and tower, and has large convenient rooms in the basement—but very little below the surface of the ground adjacent

—for the use of the Sunday School and social meetings. Rev. William Searls was pastor at the time. The society were very much indebted to him for his almost unequaled tact and energy. The church is estimated to be worth \$22,000, and the parsonage, immediately adjacent, \$3,500. The present pastor is Rev. O. A. Warren. Number of church members, 350.

#### SENECA STREET M. E. CHURCH,

Was organized February 3d, 1851. The meeting was held at the Aurora Street M. E. Church, with Hon. Amasa Dana as chairman, and the following trustees appointed:

Henry II. Moore, Benjamin Taber, Daniel F. Hugg, Chas. S. Miles and Joseph C. Burritt. The corner stone of the present edifice was laid with appropriate ceremonies at the meeting of the conference, July 30th, 1851, by the Bishop. The basement was finished on the 26th of November, and was dedicated on the next day—Thanksgiving—by a sermon by Rev. Fitch Reed. A work of revival soon began, and sixty were converted. The building was completed the next summer. It is a substantial edifice of wood, situated on the corner of Seneca and Plain streets.

The church has had the following pastors:

#### THE REFORMED PROTESTANT DUTCH CHURCH.

This church was organized April 2d, 1830, by the Rev. John H. Schemerhorn, who was at that time the general agent of the General Synod of the denomination. The new organization

was composed of some of the most influential persons of the village, and the movement was initiated with a commendable spirit of progressive activity. The original number of communicants was thirty-two.

The church was organized by the ordination of the following persons as elders and deacons:

Arthur S. Johnson was chosen as the first clerk of the Consistory.

The Rev. Alexander M. Mann, D. D., was appointed as the Missionary of the Board of Missions, and entered upon his duties June, 1830.

The first religious services were held in the Academy. During the years 1830 and 1831, the church edifice was erected on the corner of Seneca and Geneva streets, and this building is still occupied—several alterations having been made from time to time in its internal arrangements.

The church is greatly indebted in its early history, to the liberality of Gen. Simeon De Witt, and his respected son, the late Richard Varick De Witt, of Albany.

The Rev. Dr. Mann was called to the pastorate, December 11th, 1830, and remained such until March 27th, 1837, when he resigned his position and removed to West Troy.

The following have served since in the pastorate of the church:

#### ST. JOHN'S (EPISCOPAL) CHURCH.

The first record of this Parish sets forth, that a society was organized in the Village of Ithaca, under the name of St. John's Church, at a meeting held in the Methodist chapel, April 8th 1822. At that time, this part of the State knew little of the Episcopal order and form of worship. The Rev. Dr. Babcock, now living at Ballston Spa, N. Y., held services of a missionary character in this section. But that was all, save the work carried on sometime before by the faithful "Father Nash."

The Rev. S. Phinney was the first rector. He remained but a year, and little was done beside the routine services, which were held in the Academy.

In 1823, the Rev. E. G. Gear was chosen rector. His administration was full of good to the parish. The lot on the north-east corner of the Ackley estate was purchased, and in 1824, the first church edifice of brick was erected. It was opened for use, on Christmas Eve of that year. Mr. Gear's rectorship continued until 1823.

The Rev. Ralph Williston succeeded him, and remained two years (1828-1830,) during which time the church was enlarged.

In 1831, the Rev. J. D. Carder was invited to Ithace. He remained three years, and then went to Connecticut. He died a year or two since, the faithful, honored Secretary of the Episcopal Board of Foreign Missions.

Mr. Gear then returned, and after living in Linaca two years, went to the West as a pioneer missionary.

The rectorship was vacant for two years, after Mr. Gear's departure. Only occasional services were held. The people however kept together, and in 1838, the Rev. Dr. Judd assumed the charge. He remained and labored with success till 1842.

On Dr. Judd's resignation, the Rev. Mr., now Dr. Walker, was called. His incumbency, as it was the longest, so was it the most fruitful of good results temporally and spiritually. In 1844, the church was altered and enlarged. In 1845, by the exertions of the ladies, a parsonage was purchased, and in 1860, the old church was torn down and the present edifice erected

in its place—a substantial, convenient building. Besides this, during Dr. Walker's rectorship, the number of communicants increased from 38 to 125.

Dr. Walker resigned in 1865, and the same year, the Rev. W. A. Hitchcock, chaplain U. S. N., became acting rector. Under Mr. Hitchcock, a new life seemed to spring up. The new edifice was consecrated April 11th, 1866, by Bishop Coxe, and the congregation and communicants were rapidly increasing in numbers and zeal. Mr. Hitchcock however, was ordered to duty in the navy, and resigned his position at Ithaca, in 1866, much to the regret of the whole parish. He is now in Elmira, N. Y.

The Rev. J. W. Payne followed him, and is the present rector. The church is apparently flourishing, and the number of communicants is about 200.

#### FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH.

The First Baptist Church of Ithaca, began its existence under this particular cognomen in the year 1823. The body of baptised believers in Christ, constituting this church, existed for some years previously under the title of the Danby Baptist Church, but for the purpose of greater convenience and usefulness, its location was removed from Danby Village to Ithaca, and its name also changed. It has now a substantial and commodious church edifice built of brick, and situated on the east side of the city park. It at present numbers about three hundred members.

The following is a record of its pastors:

Rev. John Sears, from 1827 to 1830, then for a time it had no pastor.

- " James R. Burdick, during the year 1832, then the church was again for a time without a pastor.
- " C. G. Carpenter, from 1835 to 1837.
- " S. S. Parr, during 1838 and 1839.
- " D. Bellamy, the year 1840.
- " J. D. Cole, for 1841 and 1842.
- " H. L. Gross, during the year 1843.

- Rev. A. Jackson became pastor in 1844, and remained so through 1848.
  - " F. Glanville, during 1849.
  - " W. Cormac, in 1850 and 1851, and then for a time the church was without a pastor.
  - " J. M. Harris became pastor in 1853, and continued through the year 1864.
- " J. N. Folwell, immediately succeeded him as pastor, in 1865, and resigned April, 1869, so that the church is now without a pastor.

This church, during its history, has been blessed with a number of precious revivals, and about 800 persons have been added to it by baptism on profession of their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

#### CHURCH OF CHRISTIAN UNITY.

The movement which resulted in the establishment of the First Unitarian Society of Ithaca, is largely due to the Rev. William II. Fish, for some years settled at Cortland and McLean. It was in the autumn of 1865, that Mr. Fish, acting in concurrance with the secretary of the American Unitarian Association, began to take steps for the establishment of a liberal church in Ithaca. The first services were held on the 15th of October, 1865, in the Town Hall, the Rev. Samuel J. May, of Syracuse, officiating. Mr. Fish being at that time called to the parish of South Scituate, Mass., the charge of this matter devolved upon the Rev. Charles Low, secretary of the American Unitarian Association, and on the Rev. Mr. May. Meetings continued to be held at the Town Hall, with occasional omissions through November and December, of 1865, and January of 1866. On the first Sunday in February, 1866, the Society began to hold its meetings in the Hall of the Cornell, Library building, then newly finished. Dr. Peabody, of Cambridge, Mass., preached during that month. The Society continued to occupy this Hall, until January 1st, 1867, when they removed to the Court House, which they occupied until October of that year. At the time of the session of the New York Central Conference of Liberal Christians, in Ithaca, the meetings of the society were again transferred to the Library Hall.

On the 16th of October, 1866, the Rev. E. C. Guild, of Canton, Mass., was installed as pastor of the society, the Rev. Dr. Bellows of New York, preaching the sermon of installation.

Up to this time, all the expenses of preaching, including those of traveling, had been paid by the American Unitarian Association—the society hiring the Hall, and entertaining the preacher. After this, the society contributed in part to the support of the minister elect. The Rev. Mr. Guild continued in charge of the society until April 6th, 1868, when his resignation was tendered and accepted. His connection with the society was severed with regret, and resolutions of thanks and acknowledgments were passed by the society.

At this time also, distinct articles of association were adopted by the society, and trustees were elected.

At a meeting of the society held in Library Hall, on Monday evening, August 3rd, 1868, the Rev. J. C. Zachos, was unanimously elected as the minister of the society. He took charge on the first Sunday of the following October.

At a meeting held December 1st, 1868, the Society was reorganized under the direction of the Rev. J. C. Zachos, and a new Constitution was adopted. At this time the name of the society was changed to The Church of Christian Unity. In compliance with the revised statutes of the State of New York, trustees were elected, and a new act of incorporation was obtained. The present Board of Trustees are, Horace Mack, President; H. W. Donnelly, Secretary; Prof. William J. Russel, W. O. Wyckoff, Rev. J. Caldwell, William M. Smith, Peter B. Crandell.

The peculiarities of this religious society are, that it is entirely a "Free Church,"—supported by voluntary contributions. It is without any dogmatic conditions of fellowship, having no creed. The members meet on the broad platform of "Christian Unity," furnished by a liberal interpretation of the New Testament, and by the example and precepts of Jesus Christ.

# CHURCH OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION, (CATHOLIC.)

The first Catholic settlers came to Ithaca about the year 1830, and divine services were held in a private house for some time.

The first church organization was established under the pastoral charge of the Rev. Mr. Gilbride, at which time a small church was erected on Geneva street. The church occupies at present a convenient edifice on the corner of Geneva and Seneca streets, which was erected during the pastorate of Rev. Bernard McCool. Rev. T. O. Farrill succeeded Mr. McCool for a time.

The present pastor of the church is Rev. James Tuohy.

#### ZION M. E. CHURCH—(COLORED.)

The Zion Methodist Episcopal Church has been organized in our village nearly 45 years. It thus stands among the earliest organizations for Christian worship in this vicinity. It occupies an unpretending wooden building on Wheat street, near Corn, which will seat about 400. The number of members is about 80, over whom, as pastor, is Major H. Ross. The present church was created in 1861.

### WESLEYAN M. E. CHURCH—(COLORED.)

This church, where a number of our colored citizens meet weekly for a stability, was formed from the Zion M. E. Church about 1857. The church building was erected about eight years ago. It stands on the east side of N. Albany, near Cascadilla street. It will seat about 125 members. The present pastor is T. N. Allen, a faithful, laboring man, who was installed April 9th, 1869.

### Cornell Library.

The Cornell Library, an efficient means of education to the citizens of Ithaca, owes its existence to the public spirit and munificence of Hon. EZRA CORNELL, whose name it very appropriately bears. It is located upon the corner of Tioga and Seneca streets, having a front upon the former of sixty-eight feet, and a depth of one hundred. The building is of brick, three stories in height, and so constructed as to be substantially fire-proof.

The idea in which this enterprise originated was to bring within the reach of all classes, freely and without cost to them, the treasures of literature and science; and to stimulate and encourage the intellectual growth of the communities within its influence.

In the accomplishment of this purpose, the clear, practical intellect of the founder foresaw, as the first condition of success, that the Institution should be self-supporting; never a dependent on the tardy bounty that half sides and half destroys a needy enterprise; but possessing within itself the means of independent existence, and permanent and sturdy growth. Accordingly, the edifice erected was planned so as to contain, not only the Library and its accessories, but also many rooms so admirably adapted to business purposes as to command, at all times in the future, a large and steadily increasing rental, and thus furnish strength and vitality to the Institution, through the agency of a permanent and durable income.

The execution of this plan met the approval of the entire community. The front of the building, on the first floor, is now occupied by the post office, fitted up with an elegance and convenience rarely excelled; and the First National Bank, whose

business rooms, if not as gorgeous as those of the Metropolis, are at least as pleasant and cheerful; while the rear building is devoted to offices, all adding their share to the support of the Library. Here also is the arsenal of the DeWitt Guards, arranged and adorned with a taste and elegance which does them credit, and their drill-room, large and convenient. The Library Hall, a room for public purposes, capable of seating an audience of eight hundred persons, and lighted from the ceiling through globes of glass; the Farmer's Club Room, whose museum of curiosities and specimens of vegetable growths and mineral formations, have become both interesting and valuable; and the Hall of the Historical Society, whose collection, needing only to be arranged and systematized, is rapidly advancing in interest and importance.

Prominent among the many rare curiosities, are to be found several specimens of art executed by the "American Photo-Lithographic Co.," of Brooklyn, N. Y., of which Mr. Cornell is President. The process of photo-lithographing, enables the reproduction of maps, engravings, charts, wood cuts, &c., in enlarged or diminished size with great accuracy and rapidity. Persons wanting views &c., would by addressing the Company, corner Third Avenue and Tenth streets, Brooklyn, receive specimens of their work gratuitously.

From all these sources revenue flows, steadily and ungrudingly, into the treasury of the Library, making it no dependent upon the charitable impulses of individuals or the public; but able within itself, abundantly to secure its own existence, and promote its own future improvement. And with the additional aid of the permanent endowments, soon to be made by the liberality of its founder, it will be able to act always independently and with effect, become a recognized power in the community, and largely mould and shape the mental and moral character within the circle of its influence.

The Library itself is furnished with great beauty and elegance. Its alcove-columns represent each of the varieties of our native forest woods. The dark swarthy hue of the walnut, the delicate yellow tracery of the pine, the warm veining of the

beach and maple, the red glow of the cedar, the shining panels of the elm, the gnarled heart of the locust, the hard, white grain of the hickory, and the dusk shadings of the oak; each, with their remaining associates of the forest, combine to make interesting and beautiful, this quiet abode of Literature and Science. Its alcoves are arranged in double stories, and are capable of holding forty or fifty thousand volumes, with means of expansion and enlargement to any extent which the good fortune of the future may make desirable.

The work of filling those waiting shelves with their silent but eloquent occupants has already begun. About four thousand volumes had been selected and purchased by Mr. Cornell, up to December, 1867; among which the glowing colors of Audubon's Birds of America, and the innumerable plates of the Inconographic Cyclopædia, and the old, quaint volumes illustrating the early condition and architecture of London, indicate very clearly his purpose to make the Library collection one of great interest and excellence, and not to be baffled in its execution by even grave questions of expense.

Attached to the Library, and so arranged as to be used in connection with it, are two reading rooms, one intended to be exclusively occupied by ladies, and the other by gentlemen; to be open and ready for use at all times; where will be found the newspapers and periodical excellence of the day, and where, it is hoped, a pleasant and cheerful place will be found, to lure the young from the dissipation and revelry of idle days and wasted evenings, to the pleasures of intellectual culture, and genial and improving society.

Much of these results is yet in the future, but the foundation upon which they are to rest is already secure; and the pleasure seeker who wanders amid the unrivalled scenery which marks the head waters of the Cayuga, when tired of the roar of waterfalls, or cool drip of cascades, or summer murmur of waves, will always find welcome and rest in the quiet and pleasant alcoves of the Cornell Library. The number of volumes at present is about 6,000.

# Che Cornell University.

The establishment of Cornell University in Ithaca is due to the strenuous efforts and unbounded liberality of Hon. Ezra By act of Congress, passed July 2d, 1862, land was donated to the several States for the purpose of establishing colleges for agriculture and the mechanic arts. The share of this State was 990,090 acres, and to secure its location here, and to make it a University in reality, "where any person can find instruction in any study," he added from his private purse a gift of five hundred thousand dollars. With his usual liberality, he has since given to the University the farm and grounds on which the buildings stand-about 250 acres of good land-the Jewett collection in Geology and Palaeontology, for which he paid ten thousand dollars, besides other gifts. In addition to all these, he has given his time and his practical foresight to the He has spent about two hundred thousand dollars in locating the lands and buying up the script, when it would otherwise have been sold much below its value.

The first building was commenced in 1866, and finished early in 1868. It is of stone, 50 by 165 feet, four stories high, with a French roof. It is divided into three sections. The north and south sections being divided into students' study and sleeping rooms, while the middle section is composed of recitation rooms. The building cost about seventy thousand dollars. A second building similar to this one was commenced in 1868, and will undoubtedly be ready for occupation at the opening of the Fall trimester (1869.) It is situated about five hundred feet north of building No. 1. A wooden building, for the temporary accommodation of the chemistry, physics and botany lecture rooms and laboratories, as well as for the machine and carpenter shops, has been erected since the opening. It is two and a half

stories high, with a front of one hundred and twenty feet. A large stone building, called Cascadilla Place, commenced for a summer resort by a stock company, was finished and leased as a boarding house for students, and is under the charge of the trustees. John McGraw, Esq., has given fifty thousand dollars towards the erection of a library building and tower for the chimes. The work of excavation for the foundation has already been commenced. The corner stone is to be laid June 30th, 1869.

The course of the University is liberal in everything. Three general courses are provided—the scientific, the combined, and the classical—besides many special and optional courses. The professors are mostly young, energetic men—"men who have a reputation to make, and who can make it"—though some of them have held important positions in the best American colleges. The president, Andrew D. White, is a sample for youth, energy and ability. The students are allowed unusual freedom, their honor being depended upon. They are merely expected to behave like gentlemen. The only restriction is conformity to a simple code of military discipline for those who room in the University buildings.

The institution was formally inaugurated October 7th, 1868, under the most favorable circumstances. At that time the University was the recipient of a beautiful and appropriate present in the shape of a chime of bells, nine in number, from Miss Jennie McGraw. Their music is one of the most pleasant external features of the University. An excellent collection in Ornithology, made by the donor, has been presented by Greene Smith, Esq., of Peterboro, N. Y. The collections of models, diagrams &c., are already quite full, and have been selected from the best sources.

### Ithaca Academy.

Ithaca Academy was incorporated by the legislature of New York in the spring of 1823; but for the first two years of its corporate existence, its interests do not seem to have been separated from those of School District No. 16. The first recorded meeting of its Trustees was held late in 1825, at the house of Jesse Grant; action was taken to secure entire control of the academic property; and the first principal, Rev. Samuel Phinney, entered on his duties in January, 1826. The names of principals who succeeded him, and the dates at which they entered on their duties, are as follows:

John P. Hendrick, May, 1829. William A. Irving, May, 1831. James F. Cogswell, September, 1838. William S. Burt, September, 1839. James Thompson, April, 1843. Samuel D. Carr, July, 1846. Samuel G. Williams, July, 1859.

The Academy seems to have been greatly crippled during several of its earlier years by a considerable number of perpetual scholarships, sold to gain a temporary relief from some financial embarrassment. These scholarships were finally extinguished by purchase in 1839, under the management of the present

faithful and efficient Treasurer, William Andrus, Esq., who was first elected to that office April 8th, 1837. To his wise administration of its finances for the long period of thirty-two years, the Academy owes its extrication from the heavy debt contracted about the year 1840, in erecting the brick extension to its academic building, and its present healthy financial condition.

For more than twenty years the registers of the Academy exhibit a steady increase in its attendance. The average attendance for the year 1868-9 has been about 240.

# Public Schools.

Margaret Dudgeon, Music.

The first authentic record of the public schools of Ithaca is of the date of February, 1816, when Luther Gere was chairman and George W. Philips secretary of a meeting of the district. The building then occupied for school purposes was upon the site of the present academy, but its prior history is now un-In 1818 it was resolved to build a school house with known. The moneys for that purpose were raised in part an academy. by tax and in part by voluntary contributions of the inhabitants. The building was so far completed as to be used in 1819, but was not wholly finished until 1826. This connection between the common school and the academy continued until 1826, when the academy purchased the interest of the common school in the building and lot, and the school district purchased the lot, corner of Mill and Geneva streets. A school house was

erected thereon and first occupied for school purposes in October, 1827. In 1840 the size of the building was doubled to meet the increasing demand for school room.

In 1853 the present school house was erected on the corner of Mill and Albany streets, and the old house and site sold. The present building will accommodate about 1,000 pupils. There are three departments—primary, junior and senior. It is the object of the school to give to every person who will pursue the prescribed course of studies a good, thorough, English education, free of expense. The school, including text books, furniture and apparatus, is supported by direct tax, after applying the apportionment from the common school fund and the gospel and school lot. The school library consists of about 3,000 volumes of well selected works adapted to the wants of children and young people.

A primary school for the convenience of pupils residing in the northern part of the village, is maintained at Fall Creek in connection with the main school.

Some of the earlier records of the school have been lost, so that we are not able to give the complete list of principals. Below we give the time when the last four entered upon their duties:

### The Ithaca Journal.

THE ITHACA JOURNAL is not only the oldest newspaper in Ithaca, but it is the oldest in this section of the State. established by Jonathan Ingersoll, July 4, 1815, under the title of the Seneca Republican-Ithaca, and all the western portion of Tompkins county at that time being a part of Seneca county. In 1816 it was changed to The Ithaca Journal — the exact title which it now bears. In 1817 Mack & Shepherd became proprietors. It subsequently passed in succession into the hands of Mack & Searing, Ebenezer Mack, Mack & Morgan, and Mack In 1827 the name was again changed to the Ithaca & Andrus. Journal, Literary Gazette, and General Advertiser. year after the name was changed to THE ITHACA JOURNAL AND In December, 1833, Mack & Andrus sold the Advertiser. paper to Nathan Randall; in 1837, Randall sold to Mattison & Barnaby; and in 1839 A. E. Barnaby became the sole proprie-In 1841 Barnaby sold to Alfred Wells, and in the same year John H. Selkreg, the present proprietor, bought one-half interest, and subsequently the whole. Under him the name was again modified, and the old title under which it was published in 1817 was once more adopted, and it has since been known as THE ITHACA JOURNAL. The JOURNAL has always had a comparatively wide circulation—much greater than that of any other paper in Ithaca. Its circulation and prosperity are now greater than ever before, and its influence is wide-spread and unsurpassed in this section of the State. It has been owned and conducted for the last twenty-eight years by its present publisher, who is now largely assisted in its editorial and business management by Mr. Wesley Hooker, who has also been connected with the paper in different capacities for about twenty vears—the last seventeen years continuously. The editorial and business management at present and for the last few years have fallen almost exclusively to him, as the proprietor thereof is called much from home and his time mostly occupied in other The Journal was originally a Democratic paper, and ably supported the Democratic party and principles until the struggle came between freedom and slavery—when the party having become committed to slavery against freedom in 1856, it came to the support of Fremont against Buchanan. Since then the Journal has been a Republican paper of pronounced views, and advocates fearlessly the principles of temperance, truth and justice, and is found in support of all educational enterprises, and encourages local and internal improvements and whatever is calculated to benefit either materially or morally the village of Ithaca or the county of Tompkins. It has been enlarged and improved from time to time until it is now one of the largest, most influential and fine looking and desirable papers in the State.

# The Ithaca Democrat.

The Ithaca Chronicle was started by D. D. & A. Spencer, in February, 1828, and was continued by them until 1853, when Anson Spencer became sole proprietor. In 1855 it was changed to The American Citizen, published by A. E. Barnaby & Co. Anson Spencer again became sole proprietor, by whom it was published until Feb. 25, 1863, when it was united with the Tompkins County Democrat, which paper was started at Ithaca in October, 1856, by Timothy Malony, who continued its publication till the fall of 1860, when he died. S. C. Clisbe purchased the office, April 1, 1861. May 12, 1862, B. R. Williams purchased a half interest in the paper, and the publication was continued under the firm name of Clisbe & Williams, until Feb. 12, 1863, when Clisbe sold his interest to Williams, by

whom it was published until 25th of February, 1863, when "The Tompkins County Democrat" and "The American Citizen," were united under the name of "Ithaca Citizen and Democrat," published by Spencer & Williams. July 4, 1867, the name was modified to Ithaca Democrat, and enlarged to an eight column paper. It is still continued by Messrs. Spencer & Williams, Mr. Spencer having been at times part owner and at others sole proprietor of the business since the establishment of the "Chronicle," in 1828.

# The Ithacan.

The first number of The Ithacan was issued November 28th, 1868, with G. C. Bragdon as Editor and Publisher, and H. D. Cunningham as Associate Editor. It has made local matters of the town and county, and neighboring counties, its specialty, devoting thereto from two to three pages each week. It gives careful reviews of new books and periodicals, with other literary intelligence, and also classified condensations of general news. Brevity, freshness and variety are aimed at in its selections. By thus endeavoring to realize the ideal of a good and thorough local newspaper it has obtained a large circulation during the seven months of its existence, and a foothold that insures its permanent success.

### Masonic.

#### FIDELITY LODGE NO. 51.

A Masonic Lodge was established in Ithaca at a very early period, and sometime prior to the year 1814. The time of its establishment cannot be accurately ascertained, nor its early history be written, owing to the fact that the records of the first year of its existence were destroyed by fire. Sufficient is known, however, to warrant the statement that it enrolled among its members, many of the most influential and respected of the early settlers of Tompkins County-most of whom have since been summoned from their labors on earth to eternal refreshment in the Paradise of God-but one or two now surviving. The Lodge was in active operation down to the years 1827-8, when it became a victim to that bitter and merciless persecution, begotten of bigotry, jealousy and ignorance. Many of the faithful continued to hold secret conclaves long after the commencement of this persecution; but so vindictive and determined were the efforts of the enemies of the institution, here as well as elsewhere, that few dared to connect themselves with the fraternity, and the Lodge was; forced to surrender its warrant.

In 1847, Fidelity Lodge No. 51, was removed from Trumansburgh to Ithaca, and a warrant was granted by the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, under the hand of John D. Willard, Grand Master, to Wait T. Huntington and others, and the fraternity was again revived in Ithaca. From that time to the present, the Lodge has continued to thrive, and its communications have been regular and interesting. Its nights of meeting are the first and third Tuesdays of every month.

The Chapter kept up its organization, and received large accessions to its membership (which comprised most of the leading men of Ithaca and the surrounding country), until the anti-Masonic excitement in 1827–8, when it met the fate which befel the fraternity all over the country, and for several years suspended operations. In 1851 it was revived, and its growth since that period, though not rapid, has been healthy, and it now numbers over sixty members. But one of its original founders still survives. But its charities and benevolence are remembered by hundreds whom the institution has blessed in the past, and is still continuing to bless. The Lodge rapidly added to its numbers, receiving applications from representative men in all the walks of life, including seven clergymen, five of whom-two being Doctors of Divinity—are still holding active membership. Over five hundred members have been made, and the Lodge now numbers about one hundred and fifty. Its disbursements for sick benefits, funeral dues, relief of widows, educating orphans, and various charities within the order, have exceeded the sum of twelve thousand dollars. The Lodge soon after its organization acquired, and still retains a very considerable influence in the councils of the order at large, and has furnished one Grand Master to the Grand Lodge. It has always been and now is in a very flourishing condition in its membership, its work, and in its financial affairs, the latter having been mainly in charge of the Permanent Secretary, P. J. Partenheimer, who has been unanimously elected to that responsible office for twenty-five consecutive years.

## Belaware, Lackawanna and Mestern Bailroad.

#### CAYUGA DIVISION.

The Cayuga and Owego Railroad was chartered in 1828, and the work of laying the track between those places soon after commenced. The old strap rail was used entirely, and the work (thought a great work at that day) was completed in 1834. This was run entirely by horse power for six years. The means for getting down to the level of this village was an inclined plane, on which the cars were drawn up and let down by a windlass at the top of the hill. In 1840 steam superceded the horse power, with the exception of this plane.

In 1843 the road was sold on a mortgage to the State, to Archibald McIntyre, of Albany, and associates, who were incorporated that year under the name of the Cayuga and Susquehanna Railroad Company. In 1849 they transferred their interest to parties in New York, who rebuilt the road and relaid it with heavy iron to the upper switch station in December of that year. In the spring of 1850 the road was continued down to the pier at the head of Cayuga Lake, avoiding the old inclined plane by switching and running up the inlet valley two or three miles. The road was leased to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, who have since operated it as the Cayuga Division. William R. Humphrey has been the efficient superintendent for many years.

# Ithaca Calendar Clock Company.

This company was organized in its present form in 1866, with a capital of \$100,000. The Hon. John H. Selkreg is the president and largest stockholder of the company. Mr. William J. Storms, a man of approved business training and capacity, is the secretary; Hervey Platts is the principal salesman and traveling agent of the company, while H. B. Horton, a most expert mechanic of great inventive genius, is the superintendent of the mechanical department. All of these gentlemen are stockhold-The business of the company was never so prosperous as The sale and demand for the clocks cannot be met at the Twenty-five hands are constantly employed, and a vast amount of labor-saving machinery is driven to its utmost capacity by a powerful engine, and still clocks cannot be made to equal the orders on the company's books. The business of the company seems to warrant the opinion that it will ultimately be one of the most important interests among the manufacturing enterprises of the town.

The business office and warerooms of the company are now located at No. 40 West State street, in the west half of the Merchants' and Farmers' National Bank building. They occupy both stories and the garret, and have an extension in the form of a wing at the north, built of brick, two stories high, 25x72 feet, with a fire-proof room 20x25, in which is a 30-horse

power engine, dry-room, &c. This whole extension is filled with the most costly and ingenious machinery.

The history of Calendar Clocks is so noteworthy that we give the following account of them:

The first machine to keep a calendar carried by the clock, was the invention of J. H. Hawes, Esq., of Ithaca, and was patented in 1853. This machine would not, of its own mechanism, show the 29th February in leap year, and soon found its place on the Soon after, Mr. William H. Aikins invented a calendar which was perpetual in its operations, and readjusted itself, showing all the changes, including the 29th February. ent was issued to Aikins and Joseph C. Burritt, for their improvement, on the 19th of September, 1854. The patentees disposed of their patent, in 1854 and 1855, to Messrs. Huntington & Platts, who obtained another patent on the same machine in 1857. The Aikins machine was placed in the hands of Eugene M. and James E. Mix, for manufacture and improvement, and they gave it shape for practical use. Improvements made by the Mix Brothers were patented by Huntington & Platts in 1860 and 1862. In the winter of 1864-5, Mr. Henry B. Horton, of Ithaca, invented a new and more perfect machine to keep the calendar, aud in April, 1865, obtained his first patent of eight claims. In August, 1866, he obtained a new patent for improvements, with nine claims, making upon the calendar alone seventeen claims. These patents have been transferred to the Ithaca Calendar Clock Company, who are now manufacturing under the rights acquired as above. The value of these patents over all others lies in the fact that every part is perfectly held at all times; that the changes are made instantly and with unerring certainty at 12 o'clock at night; that motion does not in the least disturb the calendar; and that its operation is just as perfect upon the water, even in severe gales, as upon the land, and, indeed, it is the only reliable marine calendar ever yet invented.

The company are now manufacturing eight styles of clocks. Some of these are believed to be unsurpassed in beauty, and unequalled for time.

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



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
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
